### What is Enrichment?

Enrichment is part of our curriculum which gives all our children the opportunity to explore different aspects of learning with a different peer group and different staff. Each week, two years groups join forces and split into three mixed groups. Each group works together over a half term rota with a teacher or two TA's.
